Question	Stats:	Further context Relative to local challenges
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	50%	Half the class had done very little swimming at all before the swimming lessons. Most of these children were able to swim 10m and more by the end of the sessions but not proficiently. One child had a fear of water that took all 5 sessions to overcome so that she was able to enter the water independently and let go

		of the side of the pool to walk forwards and backwards in the water whilst holding on to a float.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	50%	<i>As above</i>
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	95%	<i>Almost all of the class were able to float on their backs and swim in short bursts to reach the side.</i>
