### **What is Pupil Premium?**

Pupil premium is funding to improve education outcomes for disadvantaged pupils in schools in England. Evidence shows that disadvantaged children generally face additional challenges in reaching their potential at school and often do not perform as well as other pupils affecting their life chances.

# Pupil Premium Report 2023-24

## How has The Priory Primary School spent the Pupil Premium money?

During the **2023-2024** academic year The Priory Primary School had a combined budget of **£ 11640** and **£2000** recovery premium, so **£13640** in total

The school has used this funding in a variety of ways including:

- £9,600 - LSA support
- School Trips: £213
- Access to paid school events £140
- ELSA support, framework and training: £986
- Sports events: £200
- Tuition £1000
- Books for school: £100
- Reading support subscription: £400
- Events and initiatives (including transport) to boost academic achievement - eg AIM high Maths/English: £300
- Laptops for interventions: £367x3 = £1101
- **Total = £13,640**
